## COVID-19 Vaccine Third Doses and Boosters are Available.

## What's the Difference and Who is Eligible?

The third dose and the booster of the COVID-19 vaccine are now available for certain groups of people. Find out more below.

### Who Qualifies for a Booster?

- People 65 years of age and older
- People age 50–64 years of age with medical conditions SHOULD receive their booster. Medical conditions include but are not limited to:
  - Cancer, chronic kidney, liver or lung diseases,
     HIV, Down Syndrome, heart conditions,
     diabetes, pregnancy, overweight, smoking,
     organ/cell transplant, etc.
- People age 18–49 with medical conditions (listed

### What You Should Know About the Booster Shots. \*

- It is okay to receive a different booster from your initial vaccine.
  - For example, if you first received the Moderna
  - vaccine, you may receive the Johnson and Johnson or Pfizer booster shot.
- If you received the <u>Pfizer</u> or <u>Moderna</u> vaccine, you can receive your booster at least six months after your second shot.
- above) MAY receive a booster based on individual benefits and risks.
- People 18 years of age and older that work or live in settings with a higher risk of exposure or transmission.
  - High-risk work settings include, but are not
     limited to: first responders (healthcare
     workers, police, etc.), education staff (teachers,
     support staff, daycare workers), public transit
     workers, grocery store staff, etc.
  - High-risk <u>living</u> situations may include: nursing homes, group homes, apartments, student or faculty housing, transitional housing, domestic violence shelters, etc.
- If you are unsure about whether you fit the criteria above, talk to your doctor, nurse or clinic.

• If you received the Johnson and Johnson vaccine, you can receive your booster at least two months after your shot.

# Third Dose for People who are Immunocompromised \*

The CDC recommends people 18 years and older who are moderately to severely immunocompromised (<u>more on what that means here</u>) get a third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. The third dose may improve people's response to the first two shots of their initial vaccine series. Right now, the third dose shot is available from Pfizer/Comirnaty or Moderna only. <u>\*information from CDC</u>

Talk with your doctor, nurse practitioner or staff member at your clinic to discuss whether it would make sense for you to receive a third dose or booster shot.
