Perceptions of Accessibility and Inclusion within the Greater Cincinnati Region

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Background

- Public venues are required to meet accessibility standards under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
- True inclusion allows individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) to not only physically access a space but also actively participate in meaningful ways.
- A culture of inclusion will promote health equity.



Project Aim


The current study aims to understand perceptions of accessibility and inclusivity within the greater Cincinnati region as reported by individuals with IDD and their families.


Methods

- The Access to Inclusion survey assesses Ο perceptions of accessibility and inclusivity in the greater Cincinnati region.
- The survey was developed based on Ο feedback from the DDBP Family Advisory Council. Recruitment methods included email, social media, and flyers.

Results

• Data was collected from 105 family members (83% White, 95% Non-Hispanic) and 24 adults (96% White, 100% Non-Hispanic) with IDD.


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"Inclusion training and resilience building for staff to equip handling varying needs."

- However, our results are limited by a small sample of adults with IDD and limited racial and ethnic diversity.
- These results may suggest that collaborative efforts across the greater Cincinnati community to improve accessibility and inclusion have been effective.
